

#### Is Ice Harvesting A Solution to LCYC Foamy Beer?

It is LCYC spring workday. The dock is in. A job well done. A tired and thirsty crew pulls the beer tap with thoughts of a cold refreshing beer. The frequent result is a cup of FOAM. Have you experienced the dispiriting cup of foamy beer? The solution to the problem of foamy beer is simple and has been well documented. Keep the keg cold. Cold before tapping, cold while tapping and cold while drawing. Also don't bounce the keg. It is important to keep the tap riser cold. We could focus our efforts and sharpen the present keg management process--perhaps by adding more ice, increasing the number of layers of keg management or keg cooling consultants. This has all been tried before and usually has produced a lot of foamy beer. Some flatlanders have suggested we build an LCYC icehouse and harvest enough ice, which covered with sawdust, would last the sailing season ensuring an adequate ice supply on site. I argue against an investment in obsolete ice harvesting technology. Where, for example, could we find a specialized saw for cutting the ice blocks out of the lake? When is the last time you used an ice pick? With global warming we could be cutting on thin ice. After considerable reflection (you are spared additional details) the social chair rejects ice harvesting in favor of the electric keg cooler. # **Calling All Moorings**

The ice is out and our club diver is getting
organized to start on our mooring field. For those who
took their mooring floats and pennants home for the
winter - it's time to cart them back. Please be sure your
name and mooring # are permanently painted on the
float.

When placing gear back on the lawn try to spot your relative position in the line up. It is organized by mooring field row - if you can't spot your place just leave it by the



shed. The sooner gear is back the sooner the diver can begin work. All gear must be back by May 1st to avoid incurring extra cost to the club or yourself.. Any gear requiring repairs

will be corrected and billed to the owner.. Members will be notified if anything significant is required. <u>Worn pennants will not be installed</u>. Our diver Pierre LaRocque is an expert on LCYC mooring standards and he will supply first quality Chicago (US made) hardware and handmade pennants at better than competitive prices.
