Junior Sailors travel off the lake to Compete...from J. Harris & D. Powlison 7/23/05....Smythe Area A championship results.. LCYC Sailor Brad Harris finished 3rd in a very strong Area A fleet behind Thomas Barrows (St Thomas USVI, Eastern Yacht Club) and Michael Easton (Portland ME, Portland YC). In a light air regatta sailed Thursday and Friday in Marblehead, 5 races were sailed with one throw out. Barrows was first with 7 pts, Easton second with 8 pts and Harris third with 12 pts, with finishes of 4, 1, 4, (5), 3. Barrows and Easton are arguably amongst the very best Junior Laser sailors in the country having finished 2nd and 3rd respectively in last year's Smythe National Championships and Barrows having won the US Youth Laser Championship earlier this summer. 7/13/05....LCYC's junior sailors Meredith Powlison and Kate Weaver finished 5th in the NSA Bemis Championship, held in Kennebunkport, ME on July 11. Although the top two teams clearly dominated the fleet, the next three places were close, with Meredith and Kate just three points out of third. The top three teams advanced to the Area A Bemis Championship, to be held later in July in Marblehead, MA.

rows and Easton move on to the national championship.

The event was held in 420 dinghies, in sheltered water, but in winds that averaged in the high teens with occasional gusts to around 25. Meredith and Kate's best finishes in the 7-race series were a second and a pair of thirds. They were one of two all-girl teams participating in the event. The other team finished 8th. Meredith and Kate qualified for this event by finishing second in the NSA West Bemis Championship.



HARBOR NEWS from Steve Landau

This season we have had instances of shackle threads rotting away and slipping apart when the mooring pull is slack. We are also seeing accelerated rotting of our chains due to zebra mussel excretions. Over the past few years I have repeatedly suggested that folk replace their underwater gear every four or five years. I am now warning all mooring owners to replace any old gear on a regular schedule. Diver inspections are not able to find internal metal rot beneath the layers of zebra mussels even when we clean them off. Pierre is now inspecting the field and replacing any suspect gear but I do not feel he can find all the lurking problems. If your gear is old have him replace it.

By Laws Changes from the Board

The following Bylaws change is being proposed for the Fall 2005 meeting.

At our Summer 2004 Strategic planning session the Board of Governor's identified an initiative to improve the club's focus on non-racing programs in support of a broad constituency within the club for whom sailboat racing is not their primary interest. Subsequent Board of Governors' discussion on this topic concluded that establishing a Board position for whom promotion and management of non racing programs was a key element in affecting these changes. This position would encompass, but not be limited to, the responsibilities of our current Rendezvous chair (an appointed, non-Board position). The BOG also discussed the feasibility of rearranging current Committee responsibilities in order to accommodate this new position without changing the number of Board members. It was concluded that the scope of responsibilities of the current positions was already a significant workload and it was not reasonable to add additional burden to the existing individual BOG members. Therefore, the BOG concluded it was necessary to expand the size of the Board in order to accomplish the desired goals.

The proposed responsibilities of this position are as follows:

Cruising / Boating Programs

Responsible for promotion and coordination of sailing and powerboating activities including Cruising/ Rendezvous, daysailing, boating and seamanship education programs and any other programs deemed ap-

<u>Club Rules Reminder</u> - Occasionally we need reminders of rules in place to make the club function safely and as a good neighbor.

- (1) Please do not blow horns to call the launch. Use CH12 VHF.or your cell phone.
- (2) Towing any person through the mooring field (on tubes / skis / boards / etc.) at any speed is strictly forbidden for obvious safety reasons.
- (3) The harbor is a <u>No Wake Zone</u> by USCG designation 5MPH speed limit.
- (4) No fishing or swimming from the main dock for safety reasons.
- (5) The launch is restricted to six passengers by the USCG - please do not ask to board more than six for any reason.

ARTICLE III BOARD OF GOVERNORS


Section 1. Management. The management of the Club and its affairs shall be by a Board of Governors, consisting of thirteen (13) fourteen (14) Members. The Board of Governors shall have the control and management of all business affairs for the Club; shall have authority to execute all contracts, instruments and conveyances necessary to carry out the purposes of the Club, shall determine and set annual dues; shall prepare and approve a budget by March 1 for the financial management of the Club; shall make appointments of Officers of the Club and Board of Governors and all necessary committees of the Club; shall have charge of the election, suspension or expulsion of members; and shall be responsible for the making of rules for the use of the Club facilities.

Section 4. <u>Committees</u>. The Board of Governors may establish the following standing committees and others deemed necessary:

- a) House g) Junior Sailing Programs
- b) Grounds h) Membership/Log
- c) Harbor i) Communications
- d) Docks j) Boats
- e) Regatta k) Stewards/Personnel
- f) Social I) Cruising / Boating Programs Note: Proposed changes in Red Italics
