#### CORK 2005: a Father and Son adventure

Part way through July, I get hit from son with "So Dad...I really want to take my Laser up to CORK this year". On the surface, since I have been sailing my Laser every chance I get for the past 3 summers, tagging along and sailing myself seemed like a no brainer. However, at this point, I had sailed in exactly zero real Laser regattas. As with most tough sailing related questions, I decided to consult my sailing guru/neighbor Dave Powlison..."Hey Dave, I'm thinking about sailing CORK ...waddya think?" Dave paused, "Geez John.... that's quite a bit of a step up, especially considering all the regattas you have done...". Based on this rousing endorsement, I signed us right up.

For those not familiar with CORK (Canadian Olympic training Regatta at Kingston), it has been held every August for the past 36 years in Kingston, Ontario and has become one of the premier regattas in North America. It is held out of the Portsmouth Olympic Harbor, site of the 1976 Olympic sailing events and sailed on on the far NE corner of Lake Ontario at the confluence of the St. Lawrence River. As you might infer from the name, the majority of the sailors are kids (primarily HS and College age), although there were a few of us over 30 types out there. But not so many that us gray and/or no hair types couldn't easily seek each other out and share a beer after the race without drawing a big crowd. There are a variety of classes including Laser, Laser Radial, Laser 4.7, Laser 2, 420, Byte, I-14 and 29er. In total there were almost 500 boats and between 600 and 700 sailors. The Laser classes made up about half the boats with 100 Laser Full Rigs and 140 Radials. This was an ISAF Grade 1 event for Lasers and Radials and so the top end of each fleet was well populated with the top Junior, College and National class sailors from across North America and beyond. including the top contenders for the 2008 Canadian Olympic team. One of the other neat aspects of CORK is that many of the competitors (and parents) are housed in the dorms at Queens University and St. Lawrence College, both of which are located within walking distance of the sailing center. This adds to the "Olympic village" type experience, especially for the kid, as the dorms are packed with sailors from all over North America.

The regatta is a 5 day event with one day of round robin type qualifying races (to separate the Laser and



and Silver Fleets), followed by 4 days of fleet racing. Day 1 (Saturday) dawned gray, overcast and very breezy and ended up providing a rather rude welcome to the very steep, short chop for which Kingston is also notorious. Long story short, we both ended up in the Silver Fleet (Brad in Radial and the old guy in Full Rig).

I won't bore you with all the details of the week except to say that we saw every wind condition possible from 25 kts to drifter. It was great sailing, a great venue and a really neat atmosphere. Kingston is also a really neat town with interesting architecture (including the 19<sup>th</sup> century penitentiary abutting the marina), good restaurants and nice downtown area. We learned a ton about big fleet Laser sailing. I am glad I went and we are both looking forward to going back.

Finally, as luck would have it, I parked my boat next to Peter Seidenberg who is arguably the best Grand Grand Master (over 65) Laser sailor in North America, if not the world, and I am sure the oldest guy in the CORK Laser fleet.
